This year gave us the opportunity to look deeply and intimately at the areas in which we have room to grow, in our relationships, our careers, our health and our sense of self. Cara House Coming 2022

Big News!

Bethesda House is thrilled to announce we are officially approved to build and open Cara House, which will have 26 supportive housing studio units, 16 emergency shelter beds, and comprehensive medical care, case management, and social work services. Cara House will provide housing for single adults who are recently released from incarceration or who are chronically homeless.

Since 2019, New York State jail and prison populations have been fluctuating due to changing bail reform policies.¹ However, we are currently seeing the number of people incarcerated in Schenectady County above pre-pandemic levels with a 15% increase.² On top of the increase in homeless around the country due to the COVID-19 economic fallout, we have a lot of work to do to ensure those who are released can acclimate back into society instead of becoming chronically homeless or being thrust back into the prison cycle.

In many cases, homelessness itself is considered a crime when it comes to sleeping in public places, causing public disturbances (usually in the midst of a mental health episode) or large homeless encampments. Bethesda House has made it a priority to form relationships and work in tandem with our local police to ensure as many individuals as possible make it inside our doors instead of a holding cell. These relationships paid off when an encampment was recently peacefully broken up at the edge of Vale Park and Bethesda House was able to find housing for three people from the camp.

Cara House will operate with a full staff to provide social services, financial management and education classes to help manage reintroduction back into society. Often these education classes are required as part of parole, but Cara House residents will have a greater chance of completing their courses without the pressure of external circumstances such as transportation or worrying about where they're going to get their next meal.



As we've seen for the last 29 years, one has little to no control over their physical, mental and financial well-being when they're not provided safe, adequate housing. Our success with the Housing First model will be the impetus for this next undertaking in serving our community's most vulnerable populations. We've always believed strongly in championing the individual and just because someone has found themselves behind bars does not mean they don't have gifts to share. Cara House's programming will work one-on-one with residents to re-examine their relationship with their community, build trusting relationships within a therapeutic social support network, and encourage a sense of respect and self-assuredness so they feel empowered to make decisions in their best interest. This will be in tandem to the holistic services we already provide at our main location.

If everything is lined up as planned, our groundbreaking will be this summer with a goal of opening the summer of 2022! As we are starting to see the long-term financial and mental health impacts of the pandemic, this timing is critical to ensure we are able to care for those most affected. We could not have achieved this milestone without your unwavering support and advocacy.

COVID Updates

Staying Open in the Shutdown

After over a year of shutdowns and restrictions from COVID-19, Bethesda House has continued to keep our doors open. The dedication of our staff and volunteers allowed us to keep our residents safe while continuing to operate our emergency and permanent housing for those who found themselves with nowhere to go in the middle of a pandemic. Providing safe housing options was and continues to be of the utmost importance to us, not only to keep the COVID numbers down in our community but also to provide a semblance of stability when the world changed overnight. A beacon of hope in the dark. That's been our mission since the beginning and it has carried us through the most trying of times.

Even as budgets were cut and shelters closed their doors across the country, we know that we were able to stay afloat because of the community we belong to. With your tireless support and generous donations, we may not have been able to have as many people physically in the building but we have been out in the community with our outreach and prevention services operating at full-speed. We've seen first hand how much of a lifeline Bethesda House is to the chronically homeless and impoverished in Schenectady because we treat everyone as an individual, not as a statistic. Even coming out of the pandemic, we can look at the numbers and recognize each one as a life. A life that deserves to be lived as any other. Thinking this way may feel strenuous at times, but it is a direct way to connect to our shared humanity.

As restrictions lift in New York State, we are continuing to follow CDC and NYS guidelines on capacity and spacing limits. We've slowly started to increase utilization of our daily meal and even started having outdoor barbecues, which allows us to feed a greater number of people and has been such a pleasant use of our garden area! We're greatly looking forward to the day when our hospitality room is buzzing over morning coffee, when we can all share a laugh together at our fundraisers, or when we can fill our buildings with volunteers of all ages again.

Do Your Part, Get the Shot

As we learn to navigate this new world, it's now up to us to do our part by getting vaccinated if you can. Bethesda House stands behind the safety and efficacy of these vaccines.

Due to mental health challenges and other external restraints, the homeless population faces many obstacles when it comes to making and keeping critical medical appointments. For years, our Home Health team has been transporting guests and residents to their appointments and is now making vaccine appointments a priority.

There are a number of vaccine pods around the county, including the Schenectady City Mission. By getting vaccinated, we protect ourselves and those around us from experiencing the worst symptoms of COVID-19, creating a safer community for everyone.¹

If you are feeling hesitant about getting the vaccine, know that while this particular vaccine is new, the technology behind it has been studied for decades.² The sooner we all get vaccinated, the sooner we can discover what this new normal will look like. We are encouraging all our staff, residents and guests to get vaccinated so we can start to operate our indoor space at a higher capacity, including welcoming more volunteers! Especially as the summer arrives, we want to provide a safe space to get out of the heat and make sure we have enough beds for those seeking respite. Although many of our lives may be returning to normal, so many are still experiencing the aftermath and upheaval of losing a job, a loved one or a home due to COVID-19. We see new faces every day. For those to whom the pandemic was the straw that broke the camel's back, they deserve relief and a chance to rebuild. The safer and more supportive our community is, the more chance they have.

On the Horizon

The pandemic has shone a light on so many broken pieces that had been swept under the rug - in the systems we adhere to, the communities we belong to, and in our own lives. Progress and change take time but at Bethesda House, we are committed to learning from the past while keeping our eye on the future. Our goal has always been the prevention of poverty and homelessness through adequate safety nets and holistic services. By staying ahead of the pulse, we were able to remain afloat when the world changed overnight. We had to make adjustments and sacrifices like everybody else, but we are coming out of this stronger and more prepared than we've ever been to protect the most vulnerable populations in Schenectady County.

Homelessness was already on the rise before the pandemic and has only been exacerbated since.³ Rising housing prices and decreased wage earnings have made it more difficult for people to pay rent even if they're working full-time. More than half of Americans were already living paycheck to paycheck and had little to no savings before the pandemic blew the lid off of any security they had.⁴ Even though evictions are paused, once the moratoriums are lifted, rent will be due and so many just don't have it. Brighter days are on the horizon, but we can't forget those just trying to make it to tomorrow.

With almost three decades of experience, Bethesda House is ready to take on the aftermath of COVID, providing education, shelter and services to those in need. Our Street Outreach program has been crucial in helping those who do not want to come to the shelter by providing food, seasonal clothing and other necessities. Our Code Blue and emergency shelter programs have operated this year for those in need of a place to land. Once Cara House is built and operational, we will have 26 more permanent supportive beds and 16 emergency beds to offer. We will always aim to be a beacon of light in the dark and know that helping just one life causes a ripple effect that can create a better world for us all to live in. Even after this year of isolation, we can remember that we are more connected than we realize. By choosing to see the good and potential in others, we choose to see the good and potential in ourselves. Thank you for seeing the good and potential in Bethesda House year after year.

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


